# OPPORTUNITY TO STRENGTHEN DEMOCRATIC ENGAGEMENT SKILLS

## Divided Community Project

The Divided Community Project (DCP) provides dispute resolution and systems-design expertise to help local community and university leaders enhance community resiliency and prepare for and respond to events that polarize their communities including housing shortages, increased crime and racial divisions.

Individuals who are chosen to participate as core leaders will select 6-8 individuals from their community who will attend the program and participate in their core leadership group. Five core leaders will be selected. It is anticipated that there will be a total of forty participants. Most travel costs are covered and there is no cost to the participants' community. It is expected that individuals who are selected for the program will participate in the 2.5 day session, complete a few questionnaires and be willing to report back from discussion groups.

The DCP is a collaborative effort with Fordham University Law School, the National Civic League, Ohio State University Moritz College of Law and Stanford University Law School, and is funded by the AAA-IDRC Foundation.
